Early Years services in our 3 communities of Vanderhoof, Fraser Lake and Fort St. James have been very busy this year. We had 723 adults and 1100 children attend our groups during the year!

We were very excited to have a practicum student work with the team for a short period, helping with an Indigenous focus. The activities they offered our Early Years Centre were counting in Carrier, reading books by local Indigenous authors, crafts and snacks from the Indigenous heritage.

We participated in the Farmers Market in Vanderhoof and Fraser Lake and had many families attend and learn about the Early Years Services. We will be continuing in Vanderhoof in 2023 and starting in Fort St. James. We are looking forward to reaching more families!

One fantastic group we continue to offer is the Infant Massage group. It was a success and will continue to be run as we have 2 staff recently trained in the program. Some of the other programming offered was Wild Wednesday in the summer with beautiful weather, gym time which was enjoyed by many littles, and we had end of summer celebration BBQ's. We started a Spring-Cleaning Clothing Exchange for parents as well and it has been great! Many parents appreciate this as it makes life a bit easier.

This year was exciting with COVID restrictions lifting in the communities. We had Kindergarten readiness days in each community, which all the families enjoyed attending in person. During COVID we had ran it individually so had limited families attend, but now with restrictions being lifted we had the following join

us in this event: Northwest Child Development Centre, School District 91, Carrier Sekani Family Services, YMCA, and the Vanderhoof Public Library involved. The Fort St. James Kindergarten readiness day will be in June 2023.

We continue to have lots of community support for our Early Years programming. We look forward to another successful year promoting community connections and services for children and families.

#### Clinical Director's Report

Clinical Supervision is professional support and guidance for clinical staff at Connexus. Supervision is available to offer reflection, guidance and training. When recruiting staff for clinical roles, many ask if there is the level of support available at Connexus. We are happy to say we do have this available. When meeting with staff, they use the time to help them offer quality service to clients and community members. We also meet as a clinical team to offer support to one another, as everyone has their own expertise.

Training and Cultural Competency is important to Connexus. We do our best to onboard with consistency, offer as many in-services as possible, and be open minded to support cultural awareness, sensitivity, and competency. We are working toward reconciliation and change through educating, supporting traditional initiatives and events, and changing what we do within our practices.

Community Connections and Engagement is strong for Connexus. We participate in various tables to engage with community partners and respond to community needs. When there is a gap or a need in one of the communities we serve, we work together to help respond to the needs. A perfect example is the level of anxiety we saw in youth after the pandemic. We worked hard at offering anxiety groups in community and schools. Another example is grief and loss that our community members experience. We are offering more and more grief and loss groups to help those through challenging times. We partner with the local Hospice Society, as we are the program coordinators for this program. Together, we can work at offering healing for our community members.

#### Clinical Services and Family Services

Throughout the past year, the Connexus Clinical Team was very engaged and active in the communities of Vanderhoof, Fraser Lake and Fort St. James. We continue to make adaptions to best serve our communities and continue to offer virtual and in-person options for services. The Clinical team works tirelessly through the year giving direct one to one support and group programing to children, youth, and families.

Child and Youth Mental Health (CYMH), Mental Health Support (MHS), and Sexual Abuse Intervention Program (SAIP) programs help individuals and families navigate services to promote positive mental health and ensure they can thrive and reach their full potential. These programs are remarkably busy as there is an increased need for services. In the past year, the counselling programs received 115 new referrals requesting support for children and youth.

The Clinical team meets monthly with BC Children's hospital (BCCH) to help children, youth, and families get the specialized services they need. Referrals to BCCH have increased this year and we appreciate the diagnosis, guidance, and consultation from Psychiatry at BCCH. There were 73 referrals for psychiatric assessment and consult. Of these 73 referrals there were 4 referrals from Fort St. James, 22 referrals from Fraser Lake, and 47 referrals from Vanderhoof. Further, 55 referrals were for follow-up appointments and 18 referrals were for new assessments.

Family Connections Program staff support in-person, virtual and telephone visits to maintain family connections between children/youth and their parents/caregivers. The Family Connections staff engage with clients promptly upon receiving referrals through MCFD and supported 72 clients and 170 family members in transportation and supervised visits in 2022.

Family Support and Family Preservation Program saw an increase in referrals in 2022 which speaks to the community need. Towards the end of 2022, the Family Support and Preservation program staff teamed up to develop a Family Virtual drop in where families can call, email, or come into the office to have questions answered, access resources or be provided support on how to access services. We are excited to see this unique service be expanded in the three communities we serve.





The PEACE (Prevention, Education, Advocacy, Counselling and Education) Program is a free, confidential program across BC for children and youth aged 3 – 18 years who have experienced domestic or family violence. The PEACE Counsellor works with individual clients and non-offending parents or caregivers to support their emotional and psychological needs. Another aim of this program is to develop an understanding of violence against women and girls. PEACE Counsellors also engage in community awareness through interactive presentations at local schools. Presentations are in the theme of Violence Is Preventable.

The Children and Youth Care (CYC) and Children and Youth with Special Needs (CYSN) programs experienced many successes this year. The CYC program served 55 children and youth individually and 75 in groups settings. The CYSN program served 12 individuals and 26 in group settings. There were 8 groups throughout the year with 101 children/youth involved. The topics for groups ranged from crafts, cooking, games, and gardening to emotional skills, social skills and grief and loss. Through one-on-one meetings, staff have been teaching children and youth individually about social skills, anxiety, how to deal with anger in positive ways, communication, school difficulties and family relationships.

Feedback from youth is positive; stating they enjoyed the group and are able to better understand their feelings.





# Program Highlight

Over the past couple of years Connexus has established a Wellness Drop-In at Nechako Valley Secondary School (NVSS) and at Fort St. James Secondary School (FSJSS) in partnership with Carrier Sekani Family Services (CSFS). This year we successfully established a Wellness Drop-In at Fraser Lake Elementary-Secondary School (FLESS) in partnership with Carrier Sekani Family Services. 56 youth attended the Wellness Drop-In during the year. Youth were provided resources, help with filling out referrals and given information on mental health. 15 youth attended the drop-in at FSJSS, and 41 youth attended the drop-in at NVSS.





#### **Community Living Programs**

The year 2022/23 can be summarized as a year of growth and opportunity for our Community Living Programs. Through these programs, Connexus provides support to adults who are funded through Community Living BC to achieve their goals. We supported 26 individuals through our Community-Based Programs last year and are going into the new year supporting 34 individuals! This growth meant exciting opportunities for the Community Living team, such as welcoming two new full-time Support Workers and moving to a new space to better serve the needs of the individuals in the programs. The bottom floor of Riverside Place is now a space for individuals in the Community Living Programs to come together, build friendships, and learn new skills. We are grateful to the residents and staff at Riverside ("our landlords"), for welcoming us so warmly.

One of the highlights this year was the Art Show at the library, hosted by the Craft Squad during the month of October. The individuals of the Craft Squad created a variety of arts and crafts in celebration of Community Inclusion month and worked with the Community Living staff to make the Art Show accessible and inclusive. This included the consideration of the height on which works were displayed, a video alternative to written artist bios to accommodate different levels of literacy, and meaningful engagement with the community. Through the hard work of the Craft Squad, Community Living staff, and the generosity of the community, the craft program is now fully funded through proceeds from craft sales and donations.

The Community Living Programs include a 24-hour Staffed Residential Program. The residents living at our Valley View residence thoughtfully celebrate different occasions together and support each other through life's ups and downs. It is truly wonderful to see the bond between the residents and the staff at

the home. The residents contribute to keeping the streets of Vanderhoof clean through a grant awarded by the District of Vanderhoof. They enjoy trying out new things, such as golf, and continue to rely on old favourites such as walks at the park and meeting their friends for coffee in the community. We are thoroughly excited to have received funding for renovations of the home and cannot wait to report on the results next year!

Victim Service Program supports victims and witnesses of crime and trauma in the greater Fort St. James, Vanderhoof and Fraser Lake area. The workers are based out of local RCMP detachments in Fort St. James, Vanderhoof, and Fraser Lake. Two of the three positions remained vacant for many months in 2022. While successful applicants underwent a lengthy and comprehensive RCMP clearance process before they could begin work. We are happy to report all three communities now have Victim Service Workers!

Homeless Outreach Program supports adults (19+ yrs) who require immediate outreach assistance on a case-by-case basis for a short term. Supports include shelter, food security, and start up items for housing. The dominant type of urgent assistance during 2022 was food security for the 72 clients accessing the program throughout the year and often more than once a month.

Homeless Prevention Program supports adult (19+ yrs) identified atrisk groups facing homelessness on a case-by-case basis. Supports include rental supplements and support services to help individuals access rental housing in the private (non—subsidized) housing market. During 2022, the program provided 112 incidences of rental supplement support to 49 clients within the Connexus service area.









#### Fort St. James Housing

#### Pioneer Place

Having taken on ownership of Pioneer Place in 2022, we have continued to maintain 100% occupancy with 12 low end of market independent living units for seniors. This older building is in good shape and is well maintained. Proposed capital projects include converting the aged-out gas furnaces with a more efficient centralized system, updating the common areas, and repairing flashing and eaves troughing.

#### Pioneer Lodge

On the same site at Pioneer Place, Pioneer Lodge offers two excellent Assisted Living units in collaboration with Northern Health Authority. Sourcing appropriate meals and services for these A.I. tenants has been challenging. The current financial model with only two residents is not ideal. Connexus is working with BC Housing and NHA to look at our options.

#### Westside Court

This BC Housing complex with 16 rent-geared-to-income, (RGI), units remain 100% occupied with low-income seniors and families. The buildings are in excellent condition with only minor repairs needed. The fencing may need to be replaced in the coming years. As well, we are pursuing a Meals on Wheels kitchen in the common building. Rezoning is complete and we hope to have renovations complete and staff making meals before the end of 2023.

#### Neghuni Ghunli-un, (Knowledge Keepers)

This is a new jewel of Fort St James, and construction is on pace to be ready for occupancy as early as October 2023. Neghuni Ghunli-un, (Nay-gun-ee Gun-lee-un), is 36 units of independent senior living right next to the brand-new hospital, with many units having fabulous views of Stuart Lake and the mountains beyond. There is a mix of Rent Geared to Income, Deep Subsidy, and Market rents available. Construction has largely remained on pace and on budget. Of the 36 available units, we currently have 23 applicants, and we are confident that the building will be full by year's end.

#### Up Next

Community Housing is in constant flux, as funding models evolve and community needs change. Connexus is well suited to meet those changes and remain flexible to them. The Connexus Housing Committee is working toward streamlining and improving our processes in all the communities we serve. We look forward to getting better as we grow, while looking to opportunities to provide even more housing to the region.

#### Riverside Place

Fun things have been happening at Riverside Place over this past year. For example, the building interior was given a fresh look with new paint, brightening up the corridors. We raised funds to build a new patio overlooking the park and this project was completed in the spring of 2023. During the year we were pleased to welcome so many familiar faces back into the facility following three long years of limited access due to the pandemic. The seniors have really enjoyed all the new activities as a result.

#### Riverglen Town Houses

These 34 family units are a huge asset to the community of Vanderhoof. Although there has been some turnover this year, all the units remain filled with several families on our waitlist. Like most older buildings, Riverglen is scheduled to receive some much-needed upgrades and we are hoping to see this work happen in 2023.

#### Parkview Place & Aurora Home

What an incredible year we have had. Although we have been met with some staffing challenges, we still have so much to be proud of. Since Parkview Place opened its doors last April, we have supported 23 local seniors in finding permanent affordable housing and began supporting 11 local seniors through our Aurora Home Day Program. Despite these positive numbers, we continue to maintain a waitlist which currently has 9 individuals wanting to access seniors' independent living.

Parkview Place offers two floors of seniors' independent living suites, 20 suites located on the second and third floors, as well as a unique Dementia Care program located on the first floor, called Aurora Home.

Currently operating 4 days per week, the Aurora Home Day Program offers seniors a place to gather, build relationships, develop a support network and, most importantly, belong.

Parkview Place is uniquely positioned to act as a bridge between seniors independent living and supportive community-based day services. It offers a unique program engaging both current tenants, as well as, members of the community.



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# Housing Services cont.

Seniors are engaged to work together to support each other through various social and recreational activities targeting cognition, memory enhancement, independence, social engagement and physical activity. This collaboration has resulted in creating a community network within the building where seniors are supported and partner with other tenants and participants to tackle any issues as a community. Our program has opened doors of communication and engaged seniors in a meaningful way.

This year we have incorporated many new programs into Aurora Home. Some of these include a building wide intergenerational reading program with local grade 2 students, a hydroponic gardening program; in which we sell our plants at the local farmers market and use proceeds to fund day trips, Tai Chi virtual exercise program, Community bus tours and various seasonal activities from holiday celebrations to Mardi Gras.

As we transition towards having 8 individuals, with mild to moderate Dementia, move into Aurora Home, we look forward to show casing and sharing our wonderful Parkview Place community.
